

Veterinary Assistant Certification

Handle routine animal care including feeding, assist with clinical laboratory procedures, restraints, and general treatment

Students gain valuable experience in a simulated veterinary environment. The curriculum for Veterinary Assistant includes hands-on practical work with domestic animals. Students will participate in an internship during this program. Students learn a variety of skills used in the industry, including the following:

- Veterinary medical terminology
- Low stress/Fear free handling of dogs and cats for exam, vaccines, blood draws, and medical treatments
- Understanding body language and how animals communicate
- Reviewing preventative care for cats and dogs
- Preparing animals for surgical procedures
- Identifying yeast, bacteria, and egg parasites with a microscope

Suggested educational levels:

- English literacy (reading, writing, speaking, and listening)
- Understanding of basic algebra

Suggested physical abilities:

- Access to transportation to and from clinical site for participation in their mandatory internship
- Be willing and able to handle domestic animals
- Capable of lifting 65 pounds
- Capable of sustained activity for 8 hours at a time

Courses required for this certificate: Semester 1

VET 1002 Veterinary Medical Terminology

Introduces the student to the structure of veterinary medical terms with emphasis on using and combining the most common prefixes, roots and suffixes. Includes terms related to major body systems, oncology, psychiatry, as well as clinical laboratory and diagnostic procedures and imaging. Class structure provides accepted pronunciation of terms and relative use in the veterinary specific setting.

VET 1009 Applied Comp Animal Behavior

Explores the topics of companion animal behavior and learning theory through critical reviews of behavioral literature and its implications for applied techniques in behavior and training. This course provides and understanding of how animals learn, how we can improve inter-species communication to reduce fear, stress, and anxiety, and how to apply this knowledge to the everyday treatment of animals under veterinary

VET 1016 Humane Treatment and Handling

Focuses on humane animal handling techniques in a veterinary clinical setting. Restraint, medication administration, and common clinical procedures routinely performed by veterinary technicians will be covered.

VET 1020 Office Procedures and Relations

Presents commonly encountered clinical procedures with the emphasis on the role of the veterinary technician in the management of veterinary patients and records. The course also includes introduction to veterinary management software and on-line veterinary services.

VET 1075 Special Topics: Medical Math Applications

VET 1004 Assist Large Animal & Handling

Presents commonly encountered medical and surgical conditions of common large animal species with emphasis on the role of the veterinary assistant. This course focuses on handling and specific skills necessary for the profession.

VET 1014 Vet Assist Lab & Clinical Procedures

Covers selected areas of common laboratory and diagnostic imaging procedures performed in a veterinary hospital. Emphasis is on assisting the veterinarian and/or veterinary technician with these procedures.

VET 2023 Intro to Vet Anesthesia

1

Examines basic principles in veterinary anesthesiology, including the role of the veterinary technician anesthetist, important concepts relating to various types of anesthesia, preparation of anesthetic equipment and machine, pre-operative patient management, and recording information during anesthesia.

VET 2032 Veterinary Dentistry

Examines essentials in veterinary dentistry as it concerns the veterinary technician, including dental morphology, performing a dental exam, identifying common dental problems, equipment used to perform a professional dental cleaning, the proper steps to perform a professional dental cleaning, and the role of veterinary technician in client education and preventative home care.
